Summary I develop and defend a eudaimonist virtue ethics, both against other approaches in ethics and against other kinds of virtue ethics. Eudaimonism is characterised by the ideas that only living virtuously is unconditionally good, that other things are good only relative to living virtuously, and that it is a mistake to sharply distinguish living well, living ethically and living happily. I first develop an account of what's common to all eudaimonisms, called minimal eudaimonism. I then consider what more should be said beyond the core of claims to which all forms of eudaimonism are committed. I defend purely dynamic eudaimonism (PDE) against other eudaimonisms and against non-eudaimonist conceptions of the final end for our practical reasoning. PDE is different from other eudaimonisms in holding that happiness is virtuous activity alone, that virtue is not perfectible, and that to exercise virtue is always further to develop it. These theses distinguish PDE from archetypal Aristotelian conceptions of virtue and happiness, and each has significant normative implications, which I explore.
